Speaking activities in this eBook are labelled as either controlled, freer, or communicative practice. The freer practice activities provide students with prompts that require them to make meaningful choices before they use the language. This enables students to produce the target language more independently with more of a focus on fluency than accuracy. The communicative activities are more free form in nature, giving students more control over the content and the structure of the language used.

Activity Type

Grammar and Vocabulary Game: matching, gap-fill, reforming verbs (group work)

Focus

Active vs. passive voice

Aim

To practice active vs. passive voice.

Preparation

Make one copy of the game board for each group of four. Also, provide a dice for each group.

Time

20 minutes

Introduction

In this active vs. passive board game, students race to claim as many squares as they can by completing facts with verbs in the active or passive voice.

Procedure

Divide the students into groups of four, comprising of two teams of two. Give each group a copy of the game board and a dice.

Each team should also have a different coloured pencil and an eraser.

Explain that the students are going to play a board game where they try to claim as many squares as they can by completing sentences with a suitable verb in the active or passive voice.

Both teams roll the dice. The team who rolls the highest number goes first.

If a team rolls an odd number, they can only complete an oddnumbered fact. If a team rolls an even number, they can only complete an even-numbered fact.

The team members then choose a fact and complete it with a verb from the centre of the board in the correct active or passive form, writing the verb in the space provided.

If the other team agrees the verb and form are correct, the team wins the square. If not, the verb is erased. If teams cannot reach an agreement, they can ask the teacher to adjudicate. It is then the other team's turn to roll the dice and try to claim a square.

Later in the game, if a team rolls an odd number and there are no odd sentences left to complete, the team misses a turn. The same rule applies to even numbered sentences.

The team with the most squares at the end of the game wins.

Afterwards, check the correct answers with the class.
