

Activity Type

Speaking Game: writing, asking and answering questions from prompts, guessing (pair work)

Focus

Would you rather / choose / prefer...? questions

Stating preferences

Hypothetical questions

Aim

To practice forming, asking and answering hypothetical *Would* you rather / choose / prefer...? questions.

Preparation

Make one copy of the two worksheets for each pair of students.

Level

Intermediate (B1)

Time

30 minutes

Introduction

In this expressing preferences game, students write hypothetical *Would you...?* questions for a partner and guess which choices they would make.

Procedure

Divide the students into two groups (A and B).

Give each student a corresponding worksheet.

First, students write *Would you rather / choose / prefer...?* questions to ask a partner from prompts.

Afterwards, check the questions with each group.

Answer key - Student A

- 1. Would you prefer to live in the city or in the countryside?
- 2. Would you rather lose your wallet or your phone?
- 3. Would you choose to hear good news or bad news first?
- 4. Would you rather live without hot water or Wi-Fi?
- 5. Would you prefer to make a phone call or send a text?
- 6. Would you prefer to travel backwards or forwards in time?

- 8. Would you prefer to have more time or more money?
- 9. Would you choose to receive a gift or give one?

Answer key - Student B

Next, students pair up with someone from the other group.

Working alone, students guess and underline what they think their partner's choice would be for each question.

Students then take turns asking their partner the questions and reasons for their answers. Students put a tick for each answer they guessed correctly.

The student with the most correct guesses wins the game.
